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SECTION I

INTRODUCTION

Public Safety Cadets

The Public Safety Cadets (PSC) is a nonprofit organization that aims to mentor, train and prepare young men and women for a career in Law Enforcement, Fire-Rescue or Emergency Medical Services. PSC partners with law enforcement and public safety agencies to mentor young adults to serve their communities by providing knowledge, skills and practical experiences through education and training delivered by public safety professionals that build character, physical fitness, and respect for the rule of law and human and civil rights. PSC desires to create a recruiting pipeline of young adults for careers and leadership in the public safety profession.

Through their involvement in the program, young adults, referred to as Cadets, are organized into local Units sponsored by public safety agencies to develop an awareness of the purpose, mission and objectives of law enforcement and public safety organizations. The support of the chief executive officer of the partnering agency/organization, along with a dedicated cadre of public safety professionals and adult volunteers, referred to as Mentors, provide adult leadership to ensure the success of the Cadet Unit. Although Public Safety Cadets depends on volunteer leadership, the Public Safety Cadets staff, who are also public safety, law enforcement and business veterans, are available to provide guidance and support through the national office.

Public Safety Cadets helps partner agencies to organize events and activities:

- To provide a program of leadership, ethics and career preparation training that educates young adults on the purpose, mission and objectives of public safety organizations.
- To create an opportunity for Cadets to perform community service, gain practical experience, participate in career skills competitions and team building recreational activities.
- To help prepare Cadets become better citizens and community members through character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism.

Background

The National Competitive Training Conference (NCTC), also known as the *Summer Showdown*, will bring Public Safety Cadets and Law Enforcement Explorers together from throughout the country to participate in a variety of competitive training scenarios, education seminars and demonstrations. This event will place young adults in direct conversations with law enforcement officers from local, county, state and federal agencies to learn more about timely topics and emerging trends in response to resistance and critical incident management that are gripping the law enforcement profession today.

Participants will achieve a better understanding of the roles and challenges of policing today. A timely event considering the heightened public scrutiny and passionate debate currently taking place across our nation. The success of any event like this is the leadership, support and participation of prominent law enforcement and public safety industry leaders from national, state, and local partnering agencies.

This premier event will be conducted at the Gatlinburg Convention Center, Gatlinburg, Tennessee, July 19 – 22, 2021 with participation from local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. You are invited to participate in an engaging event that will provide the opportunity to demonstrate excellence while learning how to prepare for a career in public safety through discussions and dynamic activities to better understand the roles and challenges facing the police and our communities today.

Objectives

The NCTC *Summer Showdown* strives to enrich Public Safety Cadets through the following objectives.

1. Provide an opportunity for learning, leadership development and interpersonal growth in an atmosphere of competition, seminars, demonstrations, exhibits, social networking and fun.
2. Promote the ideals and principals of the law enforcement profession.
3. Encourage sharing of knowledge, information, program ideas and best practices that will enhance existing Public Safety Cadets Units and serve as an incentive for agencies to start new PSC Units.
4. Emphasize Public Safety Cadets program goals through event activities that provide knowledge, skills and practical

- experiences that build character, physical fitness and respect for the rule of law.
5. Provide an opportunity for Cadets to learn the safe and proper handling of training aids in a competitive environment while contributing to the development of skills required by the law enforcement profession.

Participant Eligibility

The 2021 *Summer Showdown* is open to currently registered members of Public Safety Cadets Units, Law Enforcement Exploring Posts and other law enforcement career interest youth programs. All youth participants must be age 14 through 20 years old (until 21st birthday). Each Unit/Post attending the NCTC must have at least two Cadets/Explorers and a minimum of two adult Mentors/Advisors (i.e., Two-deep Leadership), both of whom must be at least 21 years of age. Units/Posts with coed participants must have at least one male and one female adult leader. Units/Posts may group together in order to achieve the “Two-deep” Leadership as well as appropriate gender coverage.

Adult Mentors/Advisors registered in good standing with their respective agency youth program may attend the NCTC to observe and participate in the Mentor seminars without youth participants.

Adult Leadership

At least two adult leaders for each Unit/Post are at all times expected to be onsite and provide oversight and supervision to the Cadets/Explorers for which they are responsible. Adult leaders must respond to any matters involving their Cadets/Explorers referred to them by Public Safety Cadets or Gatlinburg Convention Center staff.

All adult leaders must conduct themselves in a professional manner that is in accordance with the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics, the NCTC Code of Conduct and Public Safety Cadets – Youth Safety and Abuse Prevention Policy. Inappropriate or illegal behavior by an adult leader will result in immediate notification to their Chief, Sheriff or head of the participating agency and, if required, local authorities. Any unacceptable behavior may also result in the leader being removed from the event.

The Summer Showdown attendance is limited to the capacity of the host venue to conduct the variety of competitive events during the three-day event. Registration for the Summer Showdown is on a first-come, first-served basis; registrations will not be accepted once event capacity has been attained. The attendance limit for this event will be achieved very quickly following the opening of the registration period; therefore, Units/Posts are strongly encouraged to register for as soon as possible.

Registration Instructions

Online Registration

The entire registration process should be handled by the Lead Mentor/Advisor online at www.PublicSafetyCadets.org under the ‘Events’ tab, click the Blue “Register Now!” button tab. Registration must be completed and all fees paid by **July 2, 2021**. For assistance, please contact the registrar using email address: nctc@publicsafetycadets.org.

Team Assignments:

Competitive Law Enforcement Response Team Events require a minimum of 2 Cadets and a maximum of 4 Cadets. Teams for Law Enforcement Response Events will be randomly assigned (Mentors will not sign up for them). The assignment of Cadets on 2-4 member teams will be determined by the participating agency during on-line registration. The agency may change a team’s composition by notifying PSC staff at the time of event registration. Transfers with a substitution may be made in accordance with the transfer (substitution) policy, no later than 6:00 p.m., on Monday, July 19, 2021.

Teams will not know the event for which they are assigned until initial check-in at Gatlinburg on July 19, 2021. Each Team will be allowed to compete in a minimum of two Law Enforcement Response Team events and, depending on the number of conference participants/teams, will be scheduled for additional events for any available openings based on conference registration date/time (the first Unit registered for the conference will be scheduled for the first vacancy, the second Unit

registered for the second vacancy, etc.). Individual events will be scheduled based on the order the individual participant is registered for the conference.

Mentors/Advisors are requested to carefully complete all online registration forms as incomplete forms or inaccurate information will delay processing and may result in a participant not being registered in time to take part in the conference. In the event there is a substitution for the youth participant or the adult Mentor/Advisor previously registered it is the responsibility of the Mentor/Advisor to update PSC with this information via email at: nctc@publicsafetycadets.org. A non-refundable \$50 deposit for participants (both youth and adult) will be required upon initial registration in order to reserve their slot in the event. (See Fee Schedule and Payment Terms below).

Mentors/Advisors should register each participant at www.PublicSafetyCadets.org.

Each Participant both Youth and Adult must be registered individually.

Mentors/Advisors will receive a confirmation response for each registration at the email address you provide.

Any changes to any participant information after the online registration has been made, must be sent to nctc@publicsafetycadets.org. Changes and substitutions are allowed, but cannot be made online after the initial registration.

Unit Mentor/Post Advisor Check-In

Check-In will commence at the W. L. Mills Convention Center entrance adjacent to the Gatlinburg Convention Center (GCC) off of Historic Nature Trail (name of the road) on Monday, July 19, 2021 at 10:00 a.m. (CDT). A Mentor/Advisor will need to check-in upon arrival at the Gatlinburg Convention Center to ensure that all required registration forms and fees have been completed. NCTC *Summer Showdown* Identification-Wrist Bands, conference T-shirts, and competitive event assignments will be provided at that time. Competitive schedules will be provided and reviewed as appropriate.

Event Identification

All Summer Showdown participants will be required to wear event identification that is readily visible at all times to gain access to and while on the premises of the Gatlinburg Convention Center. Mentor/Advisors and Cadets/Explorers will be issued distinctive vinyl wrist bands that should be worn throughout the event. NCTC Competitive Team Judges and Staff will be issued a distinctive nylon imprinted lanyard bearing an NCTC identification card containing their name, title and affiliation. Identification will be conducted by Security Staff at the entry to the GCC and to all competitive events. Damaged/lost wrist bands may be replaced at the NCTC Headquarters Office located in the Boardroom of the GCC.

Fee Schedule and Payment Terms

Online Individual Registration Deposits

A **non-refundable** \$50.00 individual deposit is required to initiate the registration process for each participant. Deposits are paid online by credit card or by check and are due with initial registration (see Online Registration above). If a previously registered Participant (either Youth or Adult) is not able to attend the event and a replacement cannot be found, their deposit is **non-refundable** and **cannot** be applied to the event balance.

Participant Fees

The fee for each individual participant is as follows:

PSC Cadets - **\$185**

Explorers (and youth from other programs) **\$200**

PSC Mentors - **\$85**

Explorer Advisors (and adult leaders from other programs) **\$100**

Career Fair-Recruiter Fees

The fee for each agency, organization or educational institution is \$150. This fee covers space indoors at the Gatlinburg Conference Center with a table, two chairs and electrical outlet.

Payment

The total Participant Fee with a completed individual Youth, Adult, or College Fair online registration must be received by July 2, 2021.

If you didn't pay the entire fee upon initial registration, the balance can be paid online at www.PublicSafetyCadets.org. Use the blue button on the Events page to pay the balance owed. Clearly indicate "NCTC" and list participants being paid in the "**Comment Reason for the Donation/Payment**" box.

Cancellation, and Refund Policy

It is understood that unforeseen events may prevent an individual from attending the *Summer Showdown*; however, such situations must be balanced against contractual and financial obligations with the host venue facility and other costs incurred by Public Safety Cadets. Therefore, all cancellations and requests for refunds must be made by email at: nctc@publicsafetycadets.org with subject line of "**Cancellation-Refund**" and received no later than July 2, 2021 to receive a full refund **minus the non-refundable individual deposit of \$50.00**. Any refund request received between July 3, 2021 and July 19, 2021 will result in a 50% registration fee refund **minus the non-refundable individual deposit**. Any refund request received on or after the first day of the *Summer Showdown* will not be considered unless such cancellation is due to a death in the family, serious illness or other extraordinary circumstance and will result in a full refund **minus the non-refundable individual deposit**. Refunds will be processed and sent within six weeks after the event has concluded.

Transfer (Substitution) Policy

No later than on or before 6:00p.m. EDT, July 19, 2021, an individual may request, at no additional cost, that his/her paid registration be transferred to another person eligible to attend the *Summer Showdown*. The person to whom the registration is transferred must be from the same Unit/Post and of the category (i.e., a Cadet/Explorer replaces a Cadet/Explorer and an adult replaces an adult) Such request must be made by the Mentor/Advisor via e-mail to nctc@publicsafetycadets.org registration information must be completed for the person to whom the registration is transferred by 6:00p.m. CDT, July 19, 2021. The substitute must be eligible to attend the *Summer Showdown* and the Mentor/Advisor must have all required online registration completed. Required forms may be hand delivered to the Registrar on site at that time.

Required Forms

The required forms are available online at www.PublicSafetyCadets.org under the "Resource Center" tab, click "**All Resources**", then select form(s) from "National Competitive Training Conference" list as follows:

All NCTC participants are required to complete and submit this form which is available online on the PSC website. The parent or legal guardian for participants under 18 years of age must sign this form, which also provides consent to the adult leader to authorize emergency medical services for a Cadet/Explorer. **Adult leaders should retain an original copy of this form for each Cadet/Explorer in their care with the original signature of their parent/guardian, as some medical facilities will not accept a copy of the signed form for emergency consent purposes.**

Career Fair participants from law enforcement, military and colleges are required to fill out this form online which is available on the PSC website: www.PublicSafetyCadets.org.

Accommodations

General Lodging Information

NCTC participants are responsible for making their own arrangements for lodging. Neither Public Safety Cadets or 2021 *Summer Showdown* have control, responsibility or a capacity to support lodging requests. Units and Posts are expected to adhere to the Public Safety Cadets - Youth Safety and Abuse Prevention Policy when arranging lodging (available online under **Resource Center** at www.PublicSafetyCadets.org).

Public Safety Cadets, in partnership with the Gatlinburg Chamber of Commerce, has arranged room blocks with over 600 rooms at area hotels for the dates surrounding the events. Many hotels have provided special rates for PSC from July 19-23. Some have extended special rates for before and after the event. The lodging offered includes hotels and condominiums, with a variety of room, food and recreation options. All offerings are within walking distance of the GCC.

Booking Lodging

Units and Posts are encouraged to review the lodging offerings listed on the next several pages. Booking links, codes or phone numbers have been provided to support your arrangements. We encourage you to keep in mind:

Cancellation Policies – Fees related to hotel cancellations are the responsibility of the attending Units and Posts.

The cancellation windows and fees will vary from hotel to hotel as these were not negotiated.

Cut-Off / Cutout / Release Dates – This is the last date you can make reservations and get the deeply discounted PSC rate. Most hotels cutoff June 19 or June 23, one month prior to the event.

Distance – All offerings are within walking distance of the GCC.

Breakfast – Several hotels have indicated breakfast (of various types) is included in the rate. If not indicated, we encourage you to assume it is not included, unless the hotel directly advises you otherwise.

Parking Fees – These fees were not negotiated, and may or may not be included in the room rate.

Fitness Centers / Pools – Many of the offerings include access to recreation.

Meals

All meals for participants are the responsibility of the individual Units/Posts. There is a wide variety of food service in the conference center and numerous restaurants with an abundant variety of food selections at reasonable cost all within walking distance.

Hydration

All participants are encouraged to bring a reusable container for water or other suitable beverage to maintain personal hydration during the event. Water fountains are available in the Gatlinburg Convention Center.

Suggested Personal Packing List

Suggested items for Cadets and Mentors to bring to the Summer Showdown:

- Unit uniforms (please reference section *Policies and Procedures: Wearing Uniforms in Public*)
- Duty belts/weapons. Do not bring any weapons (fake or real) with you. This includes, but is not limited to, knives, batons, handcuffs, firearms, and explosives.
- Personal hygiene products (shampoo, soap, deodorant, toothbrush, toothpaste, hair care products, etc.).
- Laundry facilities may be available in your lodging choice. You will need to bring or purchase laundry detergent.
- Shower shoes (i.e., flip-flops)
- Swimwear
- Casual/walking shoes
- Personal media, ear buds, etc. (optional)
- Cameras for recreational use (Go Pros and any other types of cameras or recording devices will not be allowed in competition areas)
- ID cards with photo
- Health insurance cards
- Medications
- Money for any extra-curricular activities outside of the conference
- Snacks

Parking

Parking at the Gatlinburg Convention Center is available, but limited in designated areas at no cost. Gatlinburg Convention Center strictly enforces permit parking areas and designated no-parking zones. Individuals are responsible for any and all parking fees and fines they may incur before, during and after the event. Active training will be conducted at CDJMTC simultaneously with this event and parking will be monitored.

Special Needs or Accommodations for People with Disabilities

Gatlinburg Convention Center facilities are almost all accessible to individuals with disabilities. Requests for any special needs or accommodations must be noted during the online registration process and may entail additional costs.

Procedures And Rules

Possession of Firearms

The laws of the State of Tennessee (or City of Gatlinburg/GCC) prohibit anyone from possessing a firearm on GCC property unless they are a sworn law enforcement officer. Law Enforcement Officers may possess their issued/approved firearm and must be in uniform or readily identifiable as a law enforcement officer. ***Law enforcement officers are required to maintain positive possession of their firearm at all times. Please notify the Sevier County Sheriff's Office at (865) 453-4668 with specific questions.***

Support Services

Summer Showdown Headquarters

The headquarters office will be located in the "Boardroom" on the Upper Level of the Gatlinburg Convention Center. Please call **703-717-8168** for inquiries and assistance during the event.

Security, Communications, and Health Services

The NCTC Health and Safety office, and the Volunteer Staff Security office, will be located in Room 1 on the Upper Level of the Gatlinburg Convention Center and staffed with individuals prepared to provide assistance to all participants.

Although adult leaders have the primary responsibility for Cadets/Explorers assigned to their care, PSC volunteer staff and Gatlinburg Convention Center Security will help to provide a safe and secure environment for all conference participants. Youth and adult leaders are expected to cooperate with staff and GCC security to adhere to all conduct, health, safety and security regulations.

Local ordinances, as well as Gatlinburg Convention Center rules, mandate the complete evacuation of all buildings when a fire alarm is activated. Following the evacuation of a building, reentry is not permitted until authorized by a representative from the Gatlinburg Convention Center Security or other emergency services authority. Failure to comply with evacuation procedures may result in a fine and/or prosecution for violation of applicable ordinances or state statutes. It is to be noted the false activation of a fire alarm is a violation of the law and offenders will be prosecuted and immediately removed from the NCTC Summer Showdown.

The Gatlinburg Fire Department is a class "A" Advanced Life Support Transport service. They provide three ALS staffed ambulances responding 24-hours per day, from the three stations within Gatlinburg, the closest is one minute from the Convention Center.

In the event of an emergency involving event participants, on or off-site, it is requested a mentor/advisor from the involved unit/post contact Public Safety Cadets staff.

PSC Store

The Public Safety Cadets Store (PSC Store) will be located in the Greenbrier Room on the upper level of the Gatlinburg Convention Center. The store will be open on Monday through Thursday to obtain collectible Summer Showdown specialty items such as: Challenge Coins, Patches, Ball Caps as well as PSC Polo Shirts, T-Shirts, Proficiency Awards, Patches, Pins, Lanyards and other training aids. A display of custom Public Safety Cadets shoulder and breast patches will be available for quality inspection should you be looking to customize your unit emblem.

Summer Showdown After-Action Evaluation

The planning and production of a national event involves a tremendous amount of time and effort on the part of the PSC Competition Steering Committee and a large cadre of professionals and volunteers. The goal of every national event is to provide a safe, impactful experience, for youth members and their adult leaders. The steering committee hopes to meet that goal at the Summer Showdown. Following the competition, each Unit and Explorer Post is asked to complete an After-Action Evaluation via email.

The appraisal of the 2021 NCTC Summer Showdown, along with any constructive comments and suggestions, will help make the next national event even better. The national committee receives many suggestions for venues. The decision for a competition site is based on availability and size of activity areas, seminar facilities, exhibit/demonstration space, lodging, meal service, recreational opportunities and, of course, cost. We look forward to receiving and evaluating any suggested venue with an interest in hosting a national event and are able to meet the logistical and physical requirements while doing so at a reasonable cost.

Transportation, Attractions, and Tours

Transportation

Gatlinburg is approximately 42 miles (approximate 1hr 10min drive) from the Knoxville Airport (TYS). TYS offers ground transportation services for travel between the airport and Gatlinburg via rental vehicle, bus, taxi and Uber service. Attractions and Tours

There are many attractions in or near Gatlinburg and the Great Smokey National Park area that may be of interest to Summer Showdown participants.

SECTION III

Competitive Events

The Law Enforcement Response Team competitions as well as the Special Team and Individual competitions are the focus of the NCTC Summer Showdown. All competitions are presented with an emphasis on participation, skill enhancement and good sportsmanship. The purpose of the competitions is to foster the development of individual and team growth through personal, physical and group challenges in an environment of learning and enjoyment.

Scheduling of all events are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Units and teams will not be notified on response team scenarios until each Unit checks in at the Gatlinburg Convention Center on July 19, 2021.

Response Team Competitions

- Units interested in participating in response team competitions must complete their online registration by June 30, 2021. Scheduling will be allocated on a first-come, first served basis.
- A maximum of four Cadets/Explorers per team will be permitted to participate in law enforcement response team events. A unit may elect to register a smaller team of not less than two Cadets/Explorers but must recognize all scenarios are designed for a team of four Cadets/Explorers.
- Participation in response team competitions is restricted to individual Cadet units/Explorer Posts. Cadets/Explorers from different units are not permitted to form teams and participate in events. Each unit or post determines its own team composition but only members of that unit/post may be on team(s).
- A unit/post with multiple teams may not have any Cadet/Explorer assigned to more than one of its teams.
- All equipment and supplies required for competitive events will be provided. Cadets/Explorers may use their own equipment duty belts without training aid firearms.
- In order to preclude teams from training for particular law enforcement response events, teams will not learn the events in which they will participate until they check-in at the Gatlinburg Convention Center on July 19, 2021. Units/Posts who were unable to train due to the COVID 19 pandemic will then be on a level playing field.
- Response team events are scheduled for thirty minutes in duration and involve a briefing by the event staff after which the Cadets will react to the scenario presented. All scenarios are interactive (i.e., "hands-on") in nature and most involve role-players engaging Cadets/Explorers, who will be acting as police officers, bystander(s), possible suspect(s) or criminal(s). Upon completion of the scenario the event staff will provide a constructive feedback of the Cadets' performance.
- Should it become apparent to the staff that a Cadet/Explorer team is not prepared for or is having difficulty in reacting to a law enforcement response scenario, the event will be stopped and converted to a positive learning experience for the Cadets.
- Mentors/Advisors are not permitted to participate in or observe the briefing or actual scenario but are allowed to attend ~~te~~post event feedback.
- Cadets/Explorers are to be in uniform during team competitions.
- Cadets/Explorers are expected to adhere to staff instructions, safety procedures, the code of conduct and Law Enforcement Code of Ethics. The Public Safety Cadets organization asks that you remember the spirit of competition is to further your skills and knowledge, not focus solely on obtaining a certain score or outcome. Failure to adhere to ~~the~~ expectations will result in the full disqualification for all individual and team awards by all members of the ~~same~~ unit.

Unit/Team Scheduling

A unit/post may field a maximum of four teams in response team competitions. Each team must be composed of a minimum of two and a maximum of four Cadets/Explorers.

- Each Team will be permitted to compete in a minimum of four response team events.
- Scheduling will be assigned based on full payment of team enrollment.

Scoring and Awards for Law Enforcement Response Team Events

- Scoring for the response team events is not based on the operational methods and techniques practiced by anyone agency. Rather, performance will be evaluated on observable behaviors for competition performance dimensions, and operational methods and techniques that are safe, effective, legal, and considered to be within generally accepted

standards of law enforcement protocol.

- Mentors of Cadet units are encouraged to look to the expertise in their participating agency, or other agencies and organizations, to provide the relevant information and practices related to particular topics, as well as information contained in the frequently updated IACP Training Keys for which most agencies have a subscription. The Training Keys are also available through the IACP for a nominal cost. Mentors should seek out subject matter experts for a particular topic (e.g., a burglary detective from the department, or from another agency, to give a presentation for the protocol on dealing with a burglary in progress, etc.) to better prepare their Cadets for national, state or local competitions and enhance their overall unit program.
- Each team will be evaluated on a series of performance dimensions that are assigned point values for a total of 100 points per event. Points awarded for each team event will determine the award recipients for the event.
- Tie scores for top-tier awards will be resolved by elapsed time to complete the scenario or, depending on the event, one of the specific scored items, or a tiebreaker question presented to the team by the event staff.
- Units with a team (or teams) that scores in the top 10 percent for any event will receive a superior performance certificate for that event.
- A team will not learn of its score for an event until Thursday evening after the Awards Assembly. A score summary sheet that lists the final score and elapsed time for each competitive event in which a unit participated, along with other conference materials, will be provided to the unit mentor electronically immediately following the Awards Assembly.
- Questions or concerns regarding the scoring of these events or related matters must be directed to the chair of the response team events for the Summer Showdown by email at: nctc@PublicSafetyCadets.org.

Scoring and Awards for Special Team and Individual Events

Performance Dimensions

Scoring criteria for competitions are categorized as follows, for a 100-point possible total. Participants will be rated based on observable behavior in the following dimensions.

- SCENARIO SAFETY - Follows competition rules, follows staff directions, demonstrates proper use of safety equipment and procedures.
- OFFICER SAFETY - Demonstrates awareness of immediate and potential threat(s), demonstrates awareness of immediate environment and other subjects, demonstrates awareness of subject's hands, feet and/or weapons, demonstrates awareness of possible escape routes.
- WEAPON CONTROL - Demonstrates proper weapon handling techniques, demonstrates proper use of equipment, proper safety procedures are followed.
- TEAMWORK - Demonstrates good communication amongst team members, team members delegate assignments appropriately, demonstrates effective use of contact and cover assignments, team members demonstrate collaborative problem solving.
- CONTROL OF SUBJECTS - Demonstrates control of subject, demonstrates appropriate force options, requests/demands compliance, allows subject reasonable time to comply.
- ARREST PROCEDURES/TECHNIQUES - Demonstrates balanced stance, strong foundation for self-defense, executes movements in a fluid manner.
- PROBLEM SOLVING - Problem or issue is clearly identified, alternative solutions to the problem are appropriately identified, solutions are viable, a "best" solution, tactics, and/or techniques are selected and implemented, a logical and timely process is used during the problem-solving process.
- PROFESSIONALISM - Displays self-confidence, demonstrates appropriate body language, voice modulation and physical response, demonstrates proper verbal commands/instructions, demonstrates an appropriate presence (e.g., command, empathetic, observing) for a given situation, demonstrates proper application of authority.

Response Team Scenarios (8)

The Summer Showdown offers eight competitive team events that are based on law enforcement response scenarios. Each event is sponsored by a local, state, or federal law enforcement agency or organization.

1. Active Shooter

Response Teams are dispatched to a scene with multiple reports of an active shooter. Cadets will be provided inert handguns and patrol rifles. Cadets will be evaluated on observable behaviors in relevant performance dimensions, to include effective formation, fluid and safe movements throughout the structure, as well as ability and speed to neutralize the threat(s).

2. Arrest and Search

Response Teams will execute a search warrant and an arrest warrant at a location occupied by a suspected narcotics trafficker. Inert weapons and handcuffs will be provided. Cadets will be evaluated on observable behaviors in relevant performance dimensions, to include an effective and safe entry, situation control, arrest procedures, search effectiveness and evidence identification and seizure.

3. Burglary In-Progress

Response Teams are dispatched to a burglar alarm of an unoccupied business. Upon arrival, team members are faced with a situation with various potential dangers. The Cadets will be evaluated on observable behaviors in relevant performance dimensions, to include actions related to addressing safety issues, securing the scene and conducting any follow-up investigation, as appropriate.

4. Crisis Intervention

Response Teams are dispatched to a person in emotional distress. Cadets will be evaluated on observable behaviors in relevant performance dimensions, to include crisis intervention techniques, such as active listening, rapport development, displaying empathy, developing influence, accomplishing behavioral change, and appropriately resolving the incident.

5. Force Options

This event is designed to challenge Cadets' knowledge and skills for when to deploy force in a realistic scenario. Each Cadet will view filmed situations preceded by a narration explaining the setting (e.g., "you are walking alone down a city street" or, "you are responding to an armed robbery," etc.). Once the scene begins, the Cadet will have to take the appropriate action based upon his or her assessment of the situation and best judgment.

The Cadet will be using a specially designed training simulator with a weapon that is altered to deploy an infrared laser beam. The weapon will be holstered prior to each scene until such time the Cadet reasonably believes that he/she or another person is in or is about to be placed in imminent danger of death or serious bodily injury.

The Cadet should draw the weapon when he/she has reasonable cause to believe the use of deadly force could be necessary. The drawing of the weapon, for the purpose of this exercise, will be the same as if the video scenario was an actual event. The weapon may be drawn based on the situation in the scenario or as a result of the narrator's description of the situation.

Individual scores will be averaged for the total team score.

Training simulators provide Cadets exposure to realistic use of force situations replicated in a controlled setting that depict challenges faced by law enforcement officers every day. Training simulation is consistently reproducible for each person and allows for consistent evaluation of each participant by having them engage in an identical simulation. Common themes will be presented regarding the "split-second" critical decisions faced by law enforcement professionals each day.

Training simulators reveal how participants are likely to react in a critical situation. More importantly, simulator training allows Cadets to evaluate themselves— emotionally, physically, and honestly. They can ask themselves—am I developing the necessary skills and abilities to perform in a law enforcement situation. This activity incorporates critical decision-making, proper firearms handling, and marksmanship while eliminating safety concerns with actual firearms. The Force Options event offers a simulation experience delivering safe, effective and realistic training in a competitive environment to demonstrate some of the challenges encountered by law enforcement officers.

6. Officer Rescue

Response Teams will respond to an “Officer Down” call, with shots fired. The team will be evaluated on observable behaviors in relevant performance dimensions, to include on how quickly and efficiently they can evacuate the injured officer, and provide the appropriate life saving measures given the wound type and location. Competitors will need to be familiar with working as a team to: quickly facilitate a rescue, provide wound treatment to include tourniquet application, wound packing, and chest seals, if needed. Scoring will include overall time since it is a key component of survivability.

7. Traffic Stop

Response Teams conduct a traffic stop. Cadets will determine their assignment in the primary and secondary patrol vehicles, prepositioned to simulate the stop of a vehicle observed committing a traffic violation. Cadets will be evaluated based on observable behaviors in relevant performance dimensions, to include on their ability to safely approach the vehicle, interviewing the occupants, reacting to any unexpected situation, and concluding the stop appropriately.

8. Unknown Trouble Call

Response Teams are assigned to respond to a 9-1-1 hang up call. Upon arrival, the Cadets will have to assess, investigate and determine the cause of the 9-1-1 call. Cadets will be evaluated based on observable behaviors in relevant performance dimensions, to include the ability to investigate, reacting appropriately to a dynamic and potentially dangerous situation, and concluding the incident appropriately.

Drill Team Competition

Historically, law enforcement honor guard units have used the close order drill to demonstrate the highly motivated and disciplined appearance and movement associated with a specialized ceremonial team. The purpose of the close order drill is to move a unit from one place to another in a standard and orderly manner. The close order drill provides simple formations from which tactical formations can be readily assumed (e.g., crowd control). The drill teaches discipline by instilling habits of precision and automatic response to orders. It also increases leadership confidence through exercise of command, by giving proper commands and overall control of members of the unit.

The Drill Team Competition will be evaluated based on the Marine Corps Drill and Ceremonies Manual (NAVMC 2691). This manual furnishes information and describes procedures for close order drill. It encompasses detailed procedures for all drills and ceremonies executed by team elements ranging in size from the individual to the regiment.

Teams

The minimum Cadets/Explorers needed to compete in the drill team competition is four (4) and the maximum number is eight (8). Each team shall designate one member as a team leader. Each member must participate in all phases of the event. Support staff will be allowed to aid in technical equipment and will not be judged however they must be clearly identified to the judges prior to the beginning of the team’s performance.

Teams must provide their own equipment during the competition.

Rifles/firearms or swords are not authorized for use in this event.

The Drill Team Competition will consist of three phases: Uniform Inspection, Stationary Drill and Exhibition Phase. Teams and their members will be evaluated and judged during each phase of the competition with a focus on uniformity and military bearing.

Each phase will be conducted in the designated competition drill area. The competition area will be 75' x 75'. Teams must enter and exit the competition area at the designated point.

A. Uniform Inspection

1. Unit leader forms the unit for inspection/drill
2. The judges inspect the unit (i.e., Neatness, uniform serviceability, grooming, unit uniformity, etc.)

Note: Each team shall provide the judges a copy of their unit's SOP for uniform and grooming standards. This will ensure that that teams are not judged and/or penalized for other units 'standards. SOPs should be provided at Check-In to allow provision to the judges before the first day of the competition.

B. Stationary Drill (i.e., left/right-face, about-face, open/closed ranks, etc.)

Teams will have a maximum of 8 minutes to complete this drill to the team leader's satisfaction.

Teams will be judged on, but not limited to the following:

1. Commands, command voice
2. Response and execution of commands
3. Alignment and interval
4. Bearing, energy and command presence

C. Exhibition/Demonstration - OPEN

This is an open event. Maximum time limit for this event is 8 minutes. Teams may choose their own performance. Examples are but not limited to moving drill (marching), Posting of the Colors, Color Guard (marching and presentation of the Colors), ceremonial flag fold/casket flag and presentation.

Teams should take into consideration the positive impact their performance would have on the law enforcement image, patriotism, honor and memorializing of this profession. This phase is an opportunity for pomp and circumstance, snap and flare as it is viewed by the public.

Teams will be graded based solely on the judges 'discretion taking into account the following:

- Team Uniformity (crispness, alignment, intervals)
- Team Appearance
- Choreography (variety, difficulty and precision of movements, bearing)
- Difficulty (skill, showmanship, practice required)
- General Protocol
 - Moving drills (commands, voice, response to commands, bearing)
- Patriotism/Image/Honor
- Exceeding Time Limit = Loss of points
- Dropped equipment = Loss of points

Marching styles may vary based on each team's department so variations will not be penalized.

Team leaders must be prepared to give a quick overview of their routine to the judges before the performance to notify them of special movements, formations and directions of most movements.

Judging Drill Team Performance

Team Inspection

The Team Leader shall present the team for judging at the designated inspection location (the Inspection Line) at the proper time. The team shall fall-in on a single line or into two columns at a full-arm's length and dressed right, or in the case of two columns at open ranks and at the position of Attention. The team shall remain at attention until dismissed or otherwise told to do so by the judge. When the Team Leader is satisfied that his team is ready, he shall take his position in front of the team and inform the judge that the team is ready for inspection. Note: Judging begins when the Team Leader reports into the judge for inspection. The Leader will then be inspected for neatness, cleanliness, and military bearing. The remaining team members will then be inspected for conformity to the leader's uniform. Members of the drill team unit will be randomly inspected at the judge's discretion during the Team Inspection Phase.

Any equipment used in the Stationary Drill or the Exhibition phases, does not have to be carried or worn during the inspection. However, all equipment worn or carried will be inspected.

The individual members are judged on neatness, cleanliness, and military bearing – plus the team as a unit, is judged for conformity, precision, straight lines, etc. The leader will be given instructions by the judges, whether to stand by or follow the judge during the inspection of the team. At the end of judging for the Team Inspection, the judge will instruct the team or leader that the judging is complete and for the team exit the judging area.

Stationary Drill

The team leader will be instructed by the judges to when to begin the stationary drills. The team leader will remain in formation with the team and perform the drill with his/her team. The team will be judged on the uniformity of movement, snap, bearing, voice and response to commands. The following commands must be performed by each team in the order listed two (2) times with the exception of Fall In and Dismissed/Fall Out (order of commands will be 1-12, repeat 2-13). Some/all movements may be required to be repeated at the judges' discretion.

1. Fall In (Attention)
2. Present Arms
3. Order Arms
4. Parade rest
5. Attention
6. Left Face (x2)
7. About Face
8. Right Face (x2)
9. About Face
10. Parade Rest
11. Stand At - Ease
12. Attention
13. Dismissed/Fall-out

Posting of the Colors – This is not a required performance element. The following is a guide to be utilized if a team chooses to incorporate this element in their Exhibition/demonstration phase.

Teams will start at a designated location/entry to the judging area. Not all team members are required to Post Colors but **all team members must participate** as guide on(s) or escorts. When the team has all equipment and is ready, the Team Leader shall notify the judge that the team is ready to Post the Colors. Judging begins in this event when the judge instructs the leader

to begin. Each team will immediately begin the "Posting of the Colors." Each team will post a minimum of **two** colors (national, state, province, district, agency, or unit flag when appropriate).

1. The Team leader shall begin with "a forward march command", and then with the use of either audible or silent commands, the team leader shall march the Color Guard to the designated posting area by following the pre-set path which may require turning movements. For proper order of posting the colors, it will be toward the audience. You will need to verify with the judge or official prior to your start of the posting if you are not sure.
2. The Team Leader shall direct the Posting of the Colors in a manner, which may be done as elaborately or as simply as the team wishes. The Posting shall accomplish placing the national and (if applicable) the state, province, district, agency, or unit flags in fixed holders according to national tradition and facing in the pre-designated direction. **Be sure and check with the judge or official so you know which way to face the posting. Questions must be prior to your teams start.** The bearer/s will then return to the rank. (Teams will not be responsible for flags that are blown over as soon as the flag bearer has released the flagpole.)
3. After posting the Colors, the team will march to the designated endpoint in a disciplined and professional manner, where the team leader shall audibly command, "Color Guard Halt".
4. The Color Guard will be dismissed by the judges and proceed to exit the competition area by marching out or falling out via the same spot they entered the competition area. The team or assisting non-participating members must retrieve the colors and any other equipment as soon as the team has come to a halt after posting and exiting.

Individual Competitive Events (3)

Cadets will have the opportunity to compete against one another in the Air Pistol Marksmanship Competition and Bike Policing Competition. Individual events are:

1. Air Pistol Marksmanship (.177 Caliber)

This activity takes one hour to complete, will be conducted indoors and is available to all Public Safety Cadets/Explorers participating in the NCTC. In order to allow for as many Cadets/Explorers as possible to participate in this event, each Cadet will be only allowed to shoot in one relay.

Schedule

Each relay will accommodate 12 shooters on the indoor range in Hall 2 located on the Lower Level of the GCC. Relays will be held each hour commencing at 8AM. Lunch break will be 12N – 1PM. Competitors are required to attend an orientation and safety briefing prior to moving to the firing line. The total time required is one hour, which includes orientation and shooting.

Equipment

Cadets will be provided an air pistol (semi-automatic type), eye and ear protection, CO2 Powerlets, and .177 caliber wadcutter pellets for this event. The air pistol used for this event will be the Umarex Smith and Wesson M&P 45 Air Pistol, a pellet/BB repeater powered by one 12g CO2 cylinder that propels pellets up to 370fps. This CO2 pistol has a manual safety, double action trigger that replicates the actual handgun, three-dot fixed front and rear sights of the same design and manual operation as the live Smith and Wesson, M&P pistol.

Orientation & Safety Briefing

All Cadets will receive an orientation and safety briefing, air pistol nomenclature, proper sight picture, relay tempo and target scoring instruction prior to proceeding to the firing line.

Familiarization

All competitors will be allowed to shoot one five-shot string prior to the record stage. As this match is to reflect police standards, the shooter will not adjust sights. Shooters will observe where the hits are grouping with reference to the bull's eye and compensate for errors by "holding off." NOTE: All air pistols have been "benched sighted" for windage by the range officers so that the margin of error will not be excessive.

Course of Fire

The air pistol competition will be conducted at 10 meters using the official National Rifle Association, B-40 indoor bull's-eye pistol target. The course will be fired in six stages. A competitor will fire 5 pellets in each stage, from a fixed, standing

position. The competitor must fire all stages during his or her assigned range time only. NRA rules will govern except as modified by the program. All stages are fired with two hands (double-action only) from the standing position without any support to the body. Only five pellets are loaded for each stage of fire. Shooters will be assisted when loading on the firing line.

Distance – 10 meters (32.81 feet) **Target - B-40** (aka: 7"x 8" Air Pistol Target) **Perfect score** - 300

Tournament Information

It is each competitor's responsibility to know and obey the provisions of this bulletin. It is also the competitor's responsibility to:

1. Have full knowledge of the rules under which the air pistol competition is fired.
2. Conform to the proper firing position.
3. Have equipment that meets all rules and tournament specifications in any stage in which it is to be used.
4. Understand that after due warning of any infraction of existing rules, a repetition of the rule infraction shall be cause for disqualification for that stage or for the tournament.
5. Frame the correct target for the specific stage.
6. Maintain own scorecard, initial after completion of stages of fire, and sign completed scorecard. Ensure that the scoring official has signed.
7. Wear approved eye and ear protection.
8. Provide and wear footwear that completely covers the shooter's feet during each stage of fire.

Flip-flop type footwear is NOT acceptable.

Firearms (Air Pistols)

Only air pistols and ammunition provided by Public Safety Cadets and issued at the indoor range will be permitted. The intended firearms furnished for this tournament will be a Umarex Smith & Wesson, M&P 45 CO2 air pistol.

NO PERSONAL FIREARMS (Air Pistols) OR AMMUNITION WILL BE ALLOWED.

Scoring Devices

The use of scoring devices is limited to scoring officials and the tournament executive officer. Use of scoring devices by competitors is prohibited.

Appeals

Any appeal to the calculation of shooters' scores must be received in writing by the NCTC Office located in the Boardroom on the upper level of the GCC no later than 5:30 p.m. on July 22nd. It must be approved by the Unit Mentor and list with specificity the reason or reasons for the appeal. The appeal will address only any potential calculation errors and not the actual scoring protocol or process.

Rules

The "NRA Pistol Rules" (current edition) will apply, except as amended by this program and tournament director bulletins.

2. Airsoft Tactical Course

The Airsoft Headquarters/TrainingReplicas.com will be providing a "Tactical Clearing House" controlled engagement environment challenging body mechanics, weapon handling and decision-making skills in real world "Live Fire" tactical situations. A Cadet will engage and react to their surroundings as Safety Officers guide them through corridors, dead-ends, and doorways to clear simulated rooms while engaging hostiles and friendlies lurking in contained 3D spaces. Competitors will be provided specially designed training Airsoft simulated firearms for use on the course. Speed, Decisiveness and Accuracy matter.

3. Bike Policing Competition

Bike policing is a common and effective patrol method. This bike policing competition will provide hands-on experience that will challenge Cadets to use their biking skills to complete a designated course that typically includes, but is not limited to, the following performance elements:

- Ride 25 yards
- Perform serpentine maneuver between 10 cones
- Ride in circles around cones
- Brake in marked box

Mountain bikes and helmets will be provided for competitors.

NATIONAL COMPETITIVE TRAINING CONFERENCE “SUMMER SHOWDOWN”

CODE OF CONDUCT, AGREEMENT ASSUMING RISK OF INJURY OR DAMAGE, WAIVER AND RELEASE OF CLAIMS, AUTHORIZATION

I (name) _____ (age & date of birth) _____ declare that all statements on this form (the “Agreement”) are true and complete to the best of my knowledge. I understand that false, misleading, or incomplete information shall be cause for disqualification from or termination of my participation in the National Competitive Training Conference (NCTC) “SUMMER SHOWDOWN” to be held at the Gatlinburg Conference Center and its environs in Gatlinburg, Tennessee on July 19 -22, 2021. This event is hosted by Public Safety Cadets (a Virginia nonprofit corporation) with the support and assistance of local, state, and federal public safety agencies and educational institutions. I understand that participation in the NCTC is completely voluntary and that the NCTC is being offered as an optional activity for the benefit of the participants and that I am not required to attend or participate in this event as a condition of membership in my respective youth organization (Public Safety Cadets, Law Enforcement Exploring, etc.). I understand that the Public Safety Cadets is free to terminate my participation and remove me from the NCTC without cause at any time and that I am free to discontinue participation in the NCTC at any time. Given the nature of the NCTC, the Gatlinburg Conference Center and Public Safety Cadets requires that each NCTC participant agree to all conditions set out in this Agreement.

CODE OF CONDUCT

1. All participants are expected to adhere to the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics and act in accordance with the ideals of the Public Safety Cadets program and will:
 - demonstrate courtesy and respect to other conference participants, Gatlinburg Conference Center personnel, event staff, and visitors;
 - act and dress in a manner that will convey a positive reflection on their sponsoring agency and the Public Safety Cadets program. Participants are encouraged to wear their uniform, or other appropriate clothing that identify them as Public Safety Cadets/Explorers, as much as possible during the conference;
 - attend the scheduled seminars, activities and career fair when not participating in their assigned competitive events;
 - demonstrate integrity and good sportsmanship during all events and activities;
 - obey all rules and lawful commands given to me by any official of the NCTC;
 - secure all personal possessions and return all equipment provided to them for competitive events;
 - adhere to all local ordinances, Gatlinburg Conference Center rules and regulations and to be exemplary guests of the host venue and surrounding community.
2. In consideration of others in your lodging venue, registered youth participants (Cadets/Explorers) are expected to be in their overnight lodging and quiet from 11 p.m. until 5:30 a.m., unless otherwise directed by their Mentor/Advisor or Public Safety Cadets personnel or other event staff.
3. Male participants are not allowed in the female sleeping rooms or restrooms at any time, or vice versa.
4. Any sexual or inappropriate contact, any verbal, physical or visual harassment, or any actual or threatened violence will not be tolerated and are grounds for immediate removal from NCTC.
5. Professional and appropriate behavior shall also be reflected in any participant’s online presence and in content shared publicly on social media platforms.
6. All participants must at all times observe and follow the safe and proper handling of any training firearm simulator in their control. A failure to do so shall result in the automatic termination of a participant’s participation in the NCTC and removal from the NCTC, and such failure may result in the prosecution of any improper acts taken by the participant.
7. In addition to all other rules and regulations relating to attendance and participation at the NCTC, participants must comply with all COVID-related laws, guidelines, protocols, or procedures that may be implemented by the Public Safety Cadets, the Gatlinburg Conference Center, and the federal/state/local government in order to protect as much as possible the health and safety of all attendees, including directives for frequent hand washing, social distancing and use of face masks. If a participant experiences any symptoms associated with COVID-19, the participant must inform Public Safety Cadet personnel as soon as reasonably possible.

AGREEMENT ASSUMING RISK OF INJURY OR DAMAGE, WAIVER AND RELEASE OF CLAIMS

- I hereby:
- Declare that I am able to meet the physical and mental requirements of the NCTC with or without a reasonable accommodation.
 - Understand and accept that I am responsible for following appropriate safety procedures during the NCTC.
 - I agree to comply with the reasonable instructions and directions of the Public Safety Cadets personnel and other event staff during my participation in the NCTC.
 - Understand that my participation in the NCTC involves the risk of personal injury, including death, due to the physical, mental, and emotional challenges of the NCTC.
 - Understand that the novel coronavirus, which causes the disease known as COVID-19, has been declared a worldwide pandemic by the World Health Organization. COVID-19 is extremely contagious. The state of medical knowledge is evolving, but the virus is believed to spread from person-to-person contact and/or by contact with contaminated surfaces and objects, and through the air. People can be infected, show no symptoms and therefore spread the disease unknowingly. Evidence has shown that COVID-19 can cause serious and potentially life-threatening illness and even death. As of the date of this document, there is no known widely available government-approved cure for COVID-19, and none is anticipated to be fully available by the time of the NCTC. I am aware

the NCTC is occurring in a public location during the COVID-19 pandemic, and that my participation therefore could be hazardous. I am aware that even diligent efforts to follow public health guidance and orders cannot guarantee that participants in the NCTC will not contract the virus that causes COVID-19, and that I could be infected, seriously injured or even die due to COVID-19 or due to activities by me or others on or at the NCTC.

WAIVER OF LAWSUIT/LIABILITY: As consideration for being permitted to attend and participate in the NCTC, I forever release Public Safety Cadets, its participating Mentors, Advisors and Officers, any affiliated organizations, participating Police Departments and Sheriff Office's, the State of Tennessee, the Tennessee National Guard, and Government of the United States, and the manufacturer of any training firearm simulator used at the NCTC, along with their respective directors, officers, employees, volunteers, agents, attorneys, contractors, and representatives (collectively "Releasees") from any and all liabilities, causes of action, lawsuits, claims, demands, or damages of any kind whatsoever that I, my assignees, heirs, guardians, next of kin, spouse and legal representatives now have, or may have in the future, for bodily injury, death, or property damage, related to (i) my participation or presence at the NCTC, (ii) the negligence or other acts of any Releasee, whether directly connected to the NCTC or not, and however caused, and (iii) the condition of the NCTC. This release includes, without limitation, any claims in connection with any exposure, infection, and/or spread of COVID-19 related to attendance and participation at the NCTC. I understand that this waiver means I give up my right to bring any claims including but not limited to personal injuries, death, disease or property losses, or any other loss, including but not limited to claims of negligence and give up any claim I may have to seek damages, whether known or unknown, foreseen or unforeseen. I HAVE CAREFULLY READ AND FULLY UNDERSTAND ALL PROVISIONS OF THIS RELEASE, AND FREELY AND KNOWINGLY ASSUME THE RISK AND WAIVE MY RIGHTS CONCERNING LIABILITY AS DESCRIBED ABOVE:

Public Safety Cadets - Youth Safety and Abuse Prevention Policy for NCTC Summer Showdown Participants

Public Safety Cadets through its program, seeks to create a welcoming and nurturing environment and has zero tolerance for those whose actions may jeopardize the safety, health, or innocence of a minor. Public Safety Cadets, all participating agencies/organizations, PSC Units and Explorer Posts participating in the National Competitive Training Conference, Summer Showdown, will take all reasonable steps to ensure safety and prevent abuse. Preventative measures will include the physical, emotional and sexual abuse of registered youth participants by approved adult leaders, authorized volunteers and employees. Additionally, approved adult leaders, authorized volunteers, and employees will make every effort to identify and intervene in those instances where it is suspected or determined youth participants are being abusive to one another in any of the below captioned forms of abuse.

Definitions:

Abuse - Because it takes many forms, abuse can be broken down into the following subtypes, all of which are prohibited within the scope of this policy:

- Physical abuse: Injury inflicted on a youth.
- Sexual abuse: Contact or activity of a sexual nature between an adult and a youth.
- Emotional abuse: Mental or emotional injury inflicted on a youth by the actions of an adult.
- Economic abuse: Deliberate misuse of the money or belongings of a youth.
- Neglect: Failure to provide adequate care for a youth.

Cadet - A youth (includes Explorers) registered in good standing and actively participating in a Public Safety Cadets or Law Enforcement Exploring program respectively, while participating in the NCTC Summer Showdown.

Mentor - An adult (includes LE Exploring Advisors), having achieved the age of 21, with a certain area of expertise in the public safety profession, designated and determined suitable by the sponsoring agency/organization to perform as a trusted, knowledgeable role model to help guide and train youth in their Unit/Post.

Volunteer - An adult, having achieved the age of 21, determined suitable by the sponsoring agency/organization, who is authorized to provide frequent assistance to a Public Safety Cadet Unit or Law Enforcement Exploring Post.

Youth - For the purposes of the Public Safety Cadets program, a youth is defined as anyone 14 through 20 years of age.

Requirements:

All Public Safety Cadets programs are designed to encourage safe interaction between approved adults designated as Mentors, authorized volunteers, employees and youth participants. The following regulations are meant to keep established safeguards effective:

- Participating Components (Units/Posts) must have an established adult to Cadet ratio where there is a minimum of two adult Mentors present (may be a Mentor and an authorized volunteer).
- Mentors, volunteers and employees are restricted from being alone with a Cadet where they cannot be easily observed by others.
- Cadets will only be released to a parent, legal guardian or a person designated by a parent or legal guardian.
- Mentors will take all reasonable steps and precautions to prevent harm or injury to Cadet participants and damage to facilities utilized during official events.

General Conduct:

In an effort to provide a safe and healthy environment for both mind and body, the following regulations are meant to guide Mentors, volunteers and employees during their interactions with Cadets:

- Mentors, volunteers and employees will treat all Cadets with respect and consideration. Treatment must be fair and equal, and must not be based on sex, race, religion, sexual orientation or economic or social status. All effort must be made to avoid favoritism, or the appearance of favoritism.
- While participating in the NCTC Summer Showdown, Mentors, volunteers and employees must not possess, distribute, use or allow others to use any alcohol or illicit drugs.
- Mentors, volunteers and employees must not use harsh or inappropriate language, degrading punishment or any type of restraining device as a means of behavior management or disciplinary action.
- Mentors, volunteers and employees must not participate in or allow others to engage in any form of hazing (defined as any action or situation, with or without the consent of the participants, which recklessly, intentionally or unintentionally endangers the mental, emotional, or physical health of a Cadet or any other individual, i.e., bullying).
- Mentors, volunteers and employees must not have sexual contact with Cadets, regardless of age.
- Mentors, volunteers and employees must not engage in any form of communication (using telephone, e-mail, text message, social media application, exchange of photos/graphic images application, etc.) with anyone that is sexually suggestive or inappropriate in nature.
- Mentors, volunteers and employees must not dress, undress, shower or bathe with or in the presence of Cadets.
- Mentors, volunteers or employees must not use physical punishment in any form. The only time physical force is allowed to be used against a Cadet is when their actions are placing others at an immediate risk for serious harm.
- Mentors, volunteers and employees are prohibited from sharing sleeping locations with Cadets. This includes beds, tents, hotel rooms, dormitory rooms, communal sleeping bays and other similar areas. Mentors, volunteers or employees can sleep in open areas with Cadets during participation in official events as long as the area is large enough for the employee to have their own defined sleeping areas and other Mentors, volunteers or employees are also present.
- Sleeping locations will be assigned by age groups as follows: Cadets 17 and under; 18-20-years-old; and Adults, 21+ years old; will be roomed together in separate accommodations with a person(s) of the same gender.
- Mentors, volunteers or employees not otherwise related to or appointed guardian, may not cohabit with Cadets in private residential arrangements, i.e., share an apartment, townhouse, condominium, single family home, or other permanent residence.
- Mentors, volunteers or employees must not discuss their own sexual history, preferences or fantasies nor their use of illicit or pornographic materials while in the company of Cadets.
- Mentors, volunteers or employees are not allowed to possess any sexually oriented materials (books, magazines, videos, clothing) when conducting business, activities or participation in events in the name of Public Safety Cadets.
- When one-on-one discussion or counseling is warranted, Mentor, volunteer or employee interaction with a Cadet will take place in an area that allows for private conversation while remaining in the view of others.

These regulations do not and cannot outline every situation that may be encountered while engaged in Public Safety Cadets program activities, requiring Mentors, volunteers and employees to act with a certain degree of personal discretion with the ultimate goal of any discretionary decision or action always being the safety and security of youth in their care. Because a certain action is not prohibited in this policy does not mean it is acceptable behavior. Public Safety Cadets reserves the right to take disciplinary action against Mentors, volunteers, or employees whose actions are found to be inappropriate regardless of whether they appear in this section.
